In Roman mythology, she was identified with Diana.





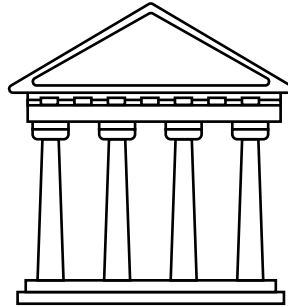

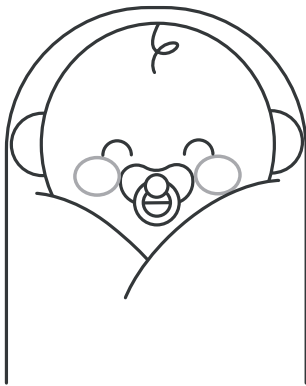


Artemis was often associated with nature and the wilderness, earning her the title "Great Mother of Nature."

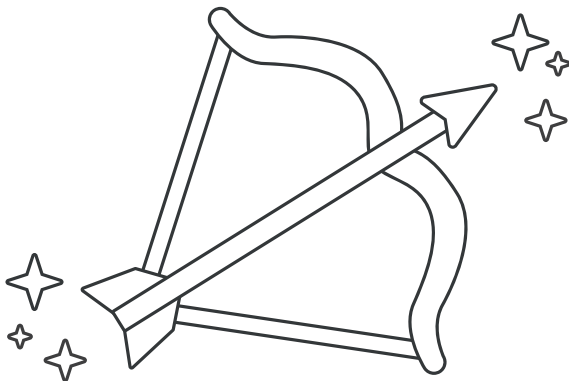

The temple of Artemis at Ephesus, Turkey, was one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. It was dedicated to her worship in ancient Greek religion. This was the second temple dedicated to her as the first one was destroyed by fire.



Artemis was known as the goddess of childbirth, but she was also the protector of young girls.



Artemis' symbols were a silver bow and arrows, which were her primary weapons for hunting and protection.
